Perspective – not a quick process

- Spanned three (3) SILC Chairpersons from start to current
- Two Governor Administrations
- Two leadership changes at the DSE/DSU
- Took from 2017 to 2020 to become a 501c3



SILC discussions

- Included in the State Plan for Independent Living (2017-2019 with extension through 2020)
 - MANY discussion during not only the development of the 2017 SPIL, but also full Council meetings
- Formed a 501c3 Committee (2017)



501c3 Committee

- Developed Workplan (2017-2018)
- Stage 1-Initial Go/No-Go Decision
- After several months of committee meetings, the SILC votes to move forward at the August 2018 SILC meeting



After the Vote to Become 501c3 (2018)

- Support of the Centers for Independent Living (supportive immediately)...
- and then there was the state...



DSE discussions

- Due Diligence conversations
- Their Workplan
- "What problem are you trying to resolve by becoming a 501c3"?



After the Vote to Become 501c3 (2019)

- Paperwork (understatement)
 - By-Law changes
 - Policies and Procedures
 - 3-year proposed budget
 - Secretary of State (done by SILC)
 - Contracted with Accountant for IRS paperwork
- \$15,000 donation toward 501c3 implementation
- New Boards & Commissions staff meetings



And finally....

- Filed in February of 2020 for 501c3 status
- Received notification of approval June 2020
